Today is Pentecost Sunday. It is the birthday of the Christian Church. Forty days after Jesus rose from the grave on Easter Sunday, we commemorated His Ascension to The Father in Heaven. Before His Ascension, Jesus promised his disciples and followers that He would not leave them comfortless, but would send *the Comforter*, the *Holy Spirit*, to guide them into all things, and to bring into existence the Church. Pentecost Sunday is about celebrating that God's Holy Spirit continues to guide His people and the Church. In our church calendar, Pentecost Sunday comes fifty days after Easter which is today.

Thank You to Our Choir. We thank them for the fine way they represented our church at the gospel concert held this past Thursday evening at the Windsor Pentecostal Church. The Choir was well represented and they sang beautifully. Thank you to Beverley and Stephanie and all the choir members for a job well done. Nearly \$1500 was raised at the concert for the Grand Falls-Windsor Refugee Outreach Project.

Another Special Day—May 22. Next Sunday is *Trinity Sunday*. Trinity Season is the longest season of the church year, as it takes us to the season of Advent. It celebrates the central doctrine of the Christian Church--God the Father, Jesus Christ the Son, and the Holy Spirit, and yet these three are one. This is one of the mysteries of faith and the very truth of who God is as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Some wonder how three separate and distinct entities can be one. In reality, the Trinity is not easy to understand, but we can perhaps understand how three things can be one at the same time. For example, consider water. It can be just water, it can be frozen ice, and it can be steam, and yet it is still only water. Trinity Sunday is a special day for our parish as it is our feast day.

Congregational Pot-Luck Luncheon. A luncheon will be held on Sunday, May 29 following the 10:30 a.m. service of Confirmation. This will be Bishop David Torrville's final official visit to our parish before he retires at the end of June, after 11 years as our Bishop. We want to honor his ministry by having a lunch together with him and his wife, Karen as our guests. This is very fitting as Bishop David was elected as our Bishop at an Electoral Synod held here at Holy Trinity in June 2005. Why to give to PWRDF for Alberta Wildfires Relief

The Red Cross is receiving matching funds from various levels of government for wildfire relief. PWRDF is receiving calls from parishes and individuals asking why they should give through PWRDF when their donation will be matched through the Red Cross.

The Red Cross is a great organization that has mobilized quickly and is doing amazing work. But they are not everywhere, and they do not do all the things we do. So here are the two main reasons that people should consider giving through PWRDF:

The Red Cross cannot be everywhere and will not reach everyone in need, especially in the chaotic early days. PWRDF (through Anglican parishes) is already on the ground and responding and will reach people who will not necessarily be reached by the Red Cross.

The Red Cross' mission is immediate relief efforts. PWRDF will be working through the Dioceses in long-term reconstruction. In Calgary after the floods, for example, we helped to refurbish some inner city ministries that were damaged, which allowed a day care to purchase new supplies and repaint their space. The Diocese also sent funds to the Siksika First Nation to help with reconstruction work there. We anticipate that similar projects will be undertaken in the wake of these fires. As Bishop Jane Alexander of Edmonton told us, "We are in it for the long haul."
